
# Letter From the Editor

## “Wanna Cry” Hack: The most wide-spread ransom hack in history


On Thursday, May 12th, over 150 countries were affected by a dangerous malware called “Wanna cry.” Upon opening the email, the software locks all of the files on the computer in question. The unknown hackers are demanding hundreds of dollars in ransom to unlock the data. The malware was most harmful to Britain’s National Health Service. Vital medical records were hacked and most hospitals were forced to cancel operations and move patients elsewhere. Among other large-scale victims were FedEx, one of Germany’s largest train operators, and several Russian banks. The ransomware was allegedly stolen from the National Security Agency. The good news (for some of us) is that it only affects Microsoft Windows systems. However, be wary of opening any unknown emails and make sure that your computer is backed up to be on the safe side.



## North Korea’s Missile Test Shows Potential Threat to U.S.

On Sunday, May 14th, North Korean leader, Kim Jong Un, supervised the launch of the Hwasong-12 missile, which reached an altitude of 2,111.5 kilometres, flying a total of 787 kilometres. According to CNN, “Analysts called this North Korea’s most successful missile test ever and a significant advancement in its quest to build a nuclear-capable intercontinental ballistic missile

(ICBM).” The missile landed in the Japan Sea and violated the UN Security Council’s resolutions. The height and range of the missile indicated that it could potentially reach the U.S. territory of Guam in the Pacific Ocean. This is the location of the Andersen Air Force Base, which is an important U.S. military base. North Korea is posing more of a serious threat than ever and it will be interesting to see how other countries act in response.



## Is Ebola Back? Or Did It Never Leave...

On May 12th, the World Health Organization (WHO) released a statement on the state of a laboratory sample that tested positive for Ebola in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC). Out of the nine suspected cases, three victims have died and six have been hospitalized. This is the eighth outbreak in the country, however, it has not been linked to the outbreak in West Africa in 2014. According to SBS, “While the most recent ebola outbreak seems unlikely to spread, health authorities are already seeing it is an opportunity to test a desperately needed vaccine in an unfolding outbreak.” One of the 12 possible vaccines has already begun to see success in Guinea.


# HUMANS OF LCC

We visited such historical places as Masada and floated in the Dead Sea. Our group also spent time in the modern and vibrant city of Tel Aviv.

For me the highlight of my trip was the March to Jerusalem when we walked from the newer part of the city to the old quarter and then on to the Kotel- the Western Wall.

The Kotel is Judaism's holiest site and as a Jew, I felt awed to be there and place a personal note into the stones, which make up the wall. 

# 2050 PROJECT

In April, Mr. Mathewson took six LCC students, including myself, on a trip to Alberta, to meet with other high schools from across Canada, so that we could present our ideas for solving problems that the world will most likely face in the year 2050.

We spent a couple of days in Calgary visiting places like DIRT Solutions and the University of Calgary, and then we were off to Banff, where we spent a lot of our time working on team building activities, getting into the design mindset, meeting with experts, discussing our ideas, and having lots of fun.

In Banff, we stayed at the renowned Banff Center for the Arts and Creativity and presented a potential problem that we would like to solve. In the world today, people don't have enough resources and knowledge to design and create sustainable buildings. So, we thought why not just integrate them into our cities?

The thing is that in a city environment one problem with trying to include new sustainable buildings is that tearing down

all the old buildings to make the new ones would create so much more pollution and waste; it would be much better to adapt the buildings we have now to greener and more energy efficient buildings. In this way, we can make a city sustainable without destroying it.

We came up with an idea to make a low-energy usage, self sustainable camp that would focus on green living and actively teach people how to include sustainability in their lives, especially in their homes.

This idea is feasible as LCC owns around 35 acres of land a little bit to the west of Montreal, in Rigaud. Originally, this land was used for research and science field trips at LCC. Teachers and students used this land to study the ecosystem and wildlife of 35 acres of wilderness away from the city.

We want this centre to be a place where people can come and see what living like this can be like, and to realize how easy it is to recreate this in our lives.

Our camp is a place for learning and creating, all while being self-sustainable.

Not only would our centre be open to elementary and high schools and their students, but it would also be open to businesses testing their prototypes, to R & D for research students, to university students that need an area for their projects, and to people that just want to come to enjoy living and learning in this fashion. Sharing knowledge in this way is a great way for people - young and old - to learn actively and have fun while they're at it.

Hopefully, this conference continues in the years to come, as I'd highly recommend this trip to anyone willing to spend their time discussing and creating sustainable solutions for the world to use in the year 2050. Great friends were made, and even greater memes were created.

With nice weather upon us, trips to Monkland are starting to become more common for the LCC crowd. All you have to do is walk down Royal Avenue to reach the exquisite and tasty Bacaro Pizzeria Urbaine, which recently opened last year. Indeed, back in April, after a hard day at school, my friends and I made the trek down to Bacaro where we indulged in a nice meal.

Upon entering the restaurant, we were greeted by the hostess who quickly escorted us to a cozy booth in the corner facing Monkland Avenue. The restaurant wasn't yet busy because they open at 3:30 on most weekdays. The vibe was urban and clean with a combination of tables and booths.

My friend started off with a Caesar salad, which I personally dislike. He said the dressing and croutons were amazing. The pizzas arrived shortly after he finished his salad. I ordered the Margarita pizza and let me tell you; it did not disappoint. It had the right combination of cheese and tomato sauce and the crust was thin and crispy.

My classmate had the Zaza, a pizza with crumbled sausages, mozzarella, red peppers and basil. I tasted it and it was savoury; the mixture of ingredients really came together.

My sister, Lily, had the cannelloni, which was stuffed with veal and cheese covered in a mild homemade tomato sauce. It was a large portion, so she took half her meal home. We all had San Pellegrino, Limonite flavour, which quenched our thirsts.


Although the pizza was filling, we still had room for dessert. We decided to share the Bacaro Brownie and the Nutella fritters, which we were told was their house specialty. The brownie was moist and the caramel sauce on top was unique. The fritters were by far the best part of the meal. They were covered in sugar and cinnamon with Nutella generously drizzled on top.

# THE AFTERMATH OF THE PK SUBBAN FOR SHEA WEBER TRADE

July 29th, 2016 marks the day that Montreal Canadiens defenseman PK Subban was dealt to the Nashville Predators in exchange for Shea Weber. This trade shocked the whole hockey world, and it is a certain fact that people will continue to monitor this blockbuster move for years to come.

This trade came about, as Montreal didn't seem to want to keep such a seemingly egocentric and flashy player who did everything in his own way. On the other hand, Shea Weber is viewed as a consistent defenseman who brings a lot of leadership experience to the team.

He was traded to the Montreal Canadiens, a team that relies on their goalie Carey Price, and has only around a two-year window to win the cup, according to many analysts, which would seem to be unrealistic. Montreal has built a team where Shea Weber doesn't have too much support on the back end and the team is incapable of scoring goals. Montreal doesn't seem to have a bright future and as long as they cannot drastically improve their core, Shea Weber will not be able to make a large enough impact.

This trade will surely continue to be debated amongst hockey fans and enthusiasts. PK Subban has apparently found the right organization where he can shine, and Shea Weber won't be able to do the same until the Montreal Canadiens organization makes some other essential changes in order to become a cup contender.

In late April, 18 Lower Canada College students had the opportunity to display some of their best artwork in the Alan Klinkhoff Gallery, located in downtown Montreal. ## Cinnamon Rolls in a Mug



Prepare Cream Cheese Icing by adding 1 Tbsp softened Cream Cheese, 2 Tbsp powdered sugar and 1 tsp milk. Set aside. Combine all ingredients (minus Cream Cheese Icing) in a mug then whisk together with a fork until combine and nearly smooth. 2 Tbsp applesauce, 1 Tbsp vegetable oil, 1 Tbsp buttermilk, 1/4 tsp vanilla extract, 1/4 cup + 1 Tbsp all-purpose flour, 2 1/2 Tbsp packed light-brown sugar, 3/4 tsp ground cinnamon, 1 dash ground nutmeg (optional), 1/4 tsp baking powder, 1/8 tsp (scant) salt. Microwave mixture on high power for 1 minute then check cake for doneness. If it is not fully cooked microwave for an additional 15 seconds. Serve warm topped with Cream Cheese Icing.




